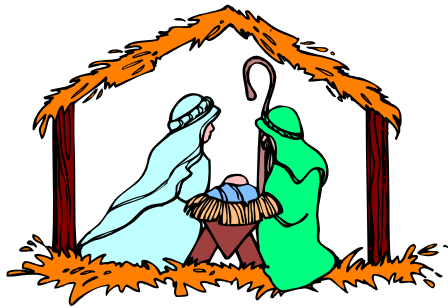

Pro-Life

We are well aware that the long anticipated Mid-Term election of November 2006 is past. It has to be admitted that the pro-life cause suffered conspicuous losses. Examples are a referendum in Missouri (approving unrestricted stem cell research (including, of course, research using human embryos, strongly opposed by our Catholic Church) and another referendum in South Dakota revoking that State's law which would have outlawed most abortions. In California and Oregon "parental notification" suffered defeats. As pointed out in an article by Cheryl Wetzstein in the November 9 Washington Times, there was some news on the other side: measures to legalize marijuana in three States and marriage amendment contests in eight States including our neighbor Virginia. Voyager readers can draw your own conclusions as to whether the shift in majority-control in the two Houses of Congress was good or bad news for pro-life; personally, we don't think so. Both sides have to realize that there are momentous effects, not just in the narrow majority-minority numbers but in the control of Congressional committees. These effects are tempered of course by the President's veto-power (however little used) and the need, in the Senate, to muster 60 votes (rather than a mere majority) for some contentious issues. Those disappointed by the election simply have to go on supporting the causes in which they believe, in the spirit of "can't win em' all".

Washington and Annapolis Outlook

As are as we know, life-issues will not figure significantly in the "lame-duck" session of Congress starting about December 1 and ending before the newly elected Congress convenes next month. It is still early for us to foresee just what issues will come before the new Congress, although it has been predicted that our side will find itself on the defensive during the next couple years leading up to the 2008 election. But remember that Congress and the President are not "the only show in town". The Supreme Court has just been hearing arguments in the case testing partial-birth abortion. Although it is said that their decision won't appear until this coming spring, it is not too early to pray that the Justices will be guided by wisdom and truth in their consideration. It is probably unrealistic to hope they will broadly reconsider *Roe v. Wade* (which permits virtually unrestricted abortion throughout this country) in the specific context of the present case, and the defeat of the South Dakota law outlawing most abortions removes what might have been an early chance to test *Roe* in the Court.

Now that the vote count for Maryland is passed, it looks as though the pro life supporters in both the Senate and House of

Delegates have suffered significant losses. We hear that stem cell research may come up again and just possibly the issue of parental notification. One happy note: Governor-elect O'Malley has indicated to the Bishops of the Maryland Catholic Conference his sympathy for a provision in the upcoming State Budget which would allocate funding for pregnancy centers. As the MCC would point out, this would only go to create a level playing field in view of the considerable amount of Maryland taxpayers' money currently going to Planned Parenthood!

Stay tuned for more solid news on life-issues as we approach the February Lobby-Night in Annapolis and the Annapolis March for Life which will take place early in the following month. Likewise for issues that will develop in the upcoming Congress in Washington.

January March for Life

Our Council is contributing \$150 toward the cost of a bus going to the Annual March for Life in Washington Jan. 22. (This is separate from a bus going that day from Sacred Heart School.) The bus is free, but - because space is limited - those planning to go should phone Sue Surine to reserve seats. Her phone is (410) 526-4593. The Parish Respect Life Committee is gratefully acknowledging our Council's generous contribution. We hope that a number of Knights and some wives too will take advantage of the bus. (Who likes coping with Washington traffic, especially homebound later in the day?)

Catechism

O This month I will address two topics from the Catechism which are both associated with the Birth of Jesus Christ.
R The first is Advent which is the time set aside by the Church to prepare ourselves for the Birth of our Messiah.
E We need this time to remember what Christmas really is, because we get too involved with the gifts and decorations and everything else associated with what Christmas has become. The second topic is our Blessed Mother, who was conceived without sin in preparation for her becoming the Mother of God and His virgin birth. The Church celebrates Her as "Ever-virgin".

524 When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming. By celebrating the precursor's birth and martyrdom, the Church unites herself to his desire: "He must increase, but I must decrease."

492 The "splendor of an entirely unique holiness" by which Mary is "enriched from the first instant of her conception" comes wholly from Christ: she is "redeemed, in a more exalted fashion, by reason of the merits of her Son". The Father blessed Mary more than any other created person "in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places" and chose her "in Christ before the foundation of the world, to be holy and blameless before him in love".

497 The Gospel accounts understand the virginal conception of Jesus as a divine work that surpasses all human understanding and possibility: "That which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit", said the angel to Joseph about Mary his fiancée. The Church sees here the fulfillment of the divine promise given through the prophet Isaiah: "Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son."

499 The deepening of faith in the virginal motherhood led the Church to confess Mary's real and perpetual virginity even in the act of giving birth to the Son of God made man. In fact, Christ's birth "did not diminish his mother's virginal integrity but sanctified it." And so the liturgy of the Church celebrates Mary as Aeiiparthenos, the "Ever-virgin".

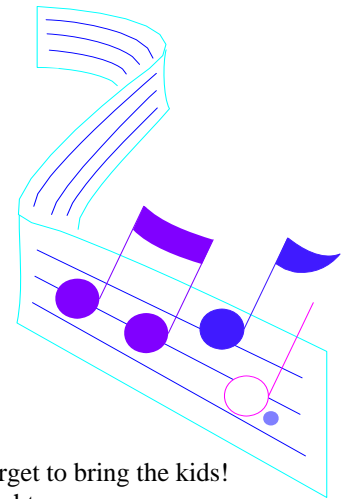

Spiritual Pilgrimage with Pope Benedict XVI

The Knights of Columbus is organizing a "spiritual pilgrimage" with Pope Benedict XVI as he travels to Turkey from Nov. 28 to Dec. 1

Knights, their families, and all Catholics are being asked to pray daily for the success of the papal visit starting the Sunday prior to the trip, Nov. 26, and continuing until Dec. 1 when the Holy Father returns to the Vatican.

This prayer was written by Supreme Chaplain Bishop William E. Lori:

Heavenly Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name, we humbly ask that you sustain, inspire, and protect your servant, Pope Benedict XVI, as he goes on pilgrimage to Turkey – a land to which St. Paul brought the Gospel of your Son; a land where once the Mother of your Son, the Seat of Wisdom, dwelt; a land where faith in your Son's true divinity was definitively professed. Bless our Holy Father, who comes as a messenger of truth and love to all people of faith and good will dwelling in this land so rich in history. In the power of the Holy Spirit, may this visit of the Holy Father bring about deeper ties of understanding, cooperation, and peace among Roman Catholics, the Orthodox, and those who profess Islam. May the prayers and events of these historic days greatly contribute both to greater accord among those who worship you, the living and true God, and also to peace in our world so often torn apart by war and sectarian violence.

We also ask, O Heavenly Father, that you watch over and protect Pope Benedict and entrust him to the loving care of Mary, under the title of Our Lady of Fatima, a title cherished both by Catholics and Muslims. Through her prayers and maternal love, may Pope Benedict be kept safe from all harm as he prays, bears witness to the Gospel, and invites all peoples to a dialogue of faith, reason, and love. We make our prayer through Christ, our Lord.
